Covid-Related Information

We have now received CO2 Monitors from the DfE - each classroom now has one and these are being used to monitor ventilation in the rooms. This is helping teachers to control the ventilation in the rooms to levels that are effective and also allow the children to feel a bit warmer in the winter too.

Should your child have symptoms of Covid, you will need to ensure your child remains at home and get a PCR test for them. Symptoms are

- a high temperature
- a persistent new cough
- a loss of sense of taste or smell

We are also aware that the Delta variant may have other symptoms too, and we will advise you if we feel it wise to get tested to rule Covid out.

You will also be aware that the rules are different if you test positive with the Omicron variant. If you are informed that this is the case, please let us know. All contacts would then have to self-isolate for 10 days.

Journeys to School

Traffic and parking around Longsands Road at the start and the end of the school day continues to be very busy.

Don't forget to try one of the following:

- Keep the area around the school site as free from traffic as possible at the start and end of the day
- Walk or cycle to school
- Park a little further along Longsands Road and walk the final part of the journey
- If you have a little more time, could you park at Priory Park car park and make use of the traffic-free path up to Longsands Road by Priory Park?
- Leave the zig-zags completely clear of traffic if you have to come to school

Reading for Pleasure

We continue to focus on nurturing a love of reading with all our children. Teachers promote reading with children through their class readers, and within english lessons - where the units of learning always start from a book.

Enjoying a story with your child at home is one of the best things your can do to to help with this. There are so many fantastic children's books to read - and your child's class teacher would be happy to help with recommending authors to try.

It's also great to discuss books together - and by doing so, you can really support your child's understanding.

Below are some questions that you might find helpful to try. There are also more suggestions in the front of your child's log book.

Before reading the book:

Is this book fiction (story) or non-fiction? How does it look similar or different to other books that you have read? What do you predict this book will be about? What makes you think that? What genre will this story be? E.g. fantasy, comedy, horror. What do we call the writing on the back of the book? (Blurb) What does the blurb tell us? **During the reading of the book:** What has happened so far? Is it what you expected to happen? What do you predict might happen next? Choose one character to describe what they are like.

(Non-fiction) Recall 5 facts that you've learnt so far.

Who is the character you like least? Why?

Find 2 sentences which describe the setting.

At the end of the book:

Which part of the book is your favourite / least favourite? Why?

Would you change any part of the book? How?

Would you change any of the characters? How?

Which part of the story was the funniest, scariest, saddest, and happiest? Find some evidence in the text to support your opinion.

Would you like to read another book by this author? Why?

Does your opinion of this character change during the story? How? Why?

Pick one character from the book. How did they feel at the beginning? In the middle? At the end? Does it change?

Find 2 things the author wrote about this character that made him / her likeable or unlikeable?
